

CHANGI COMMUNITY CLUB VISIT TO GREEN ARK FISH FARM

WHAT Green Ark is one of the first closed containment fish farms in the world. It is a floating structure about the size of two classrooms.



WHERE Located 5km off Changi Point, the farm can produce 166, 000 kilograms of fish a year. The fish are housed in four gigantic tanks. The fish reared include barramundi, red snapper and grouper. They are mainly for local consumption.

HOW The fish swim in isolation and are safe from threats such as oil spills and plankton blooms which could kill them. The sea water they live in is filtered. Bacteria and viruses are destroyed by ozonation. In this process, oxygen is pumped into the tanks every hour.

"All these improved conditions ensure that the water quality remains high. This enables our fish to thrive."

FISHY TALES

Here is some interesting information on three kinds of fish reared at Green Ark Fish Farm:

Barramundi

Also known as the Asian Seabass, it has a firm texture. Almost all barramundi are born male. They turn into females when they are 3 to 4 years old. A large female can produce more than 32 million eggs in a season!

Red Snapper

It has red eyes and is rosy-red all over. A female spawns over 20 times a year. A large fish can produce over 2 million eggs per spawn. People like it for its fine texture and sweet flavour.

Grouper

One common species eaten in Singapore is the Coral Grouper. The flesh is delicate and it is usually eaten steamed. Groupers first function as females and later transform into males.

I have never thought of myself as an adventurous traveller. Many of my earlier travels involved relaxing by the poolside or walking along a shopping street. I was not one for hiking – usually, the only thing that can get me to embark on a trek is the fear of missing out. Out of all the adventurous trips I have been on, almost each and every one of them were undertaken as I did not want to miss out. As they say, "Live Life to the fullest and don't miss out on anything!".

On my first trip to Georgia, every traveller I met spoke about a particular hike in the Greater Caucasus mountains that I absolutely could not miss. I knew instantly that this hike is one which I must try out. Almost immediately, I set about making arrangements for it. I remembered counting down the days to when I would set off for my adventure.

The hike involved a trek from Kazbegi town to Gergeti Trinity Church. Although it is a short trek, I knew it was not going to be an easy hike for me because the church's location is atop a mountain. Moreover, after six weeks of travelling around and living off *khachapuri*, the country's famous "cheese pie", I was not in the best of condition for such an arduous climb. I arrived in Kazbegi on a cold, foggy afternoon and reluctantly woke up early the next day with the idea to hike to the church. Luckily, a chance encounter over the breakfast table at my guesthouse saved me.

I met Tim and Mary by chance and got around to chatting with them. They had just completed the hike the previous day and gave me a crucial tip: Do not follow the main trail; instead, take the path on the left side of the mountain. I made sure to bear that in mind when I started my own hike.

As it turned out, the main route – the trail that almost everyone else was taking – was impossibly steep. It was also hard to manoeuvre around, and it would have definitely worn me out before I could complete the journey. However, the lesser-walked path that was recommended by the couple I had met the day before turned out to be a gentle, ambling trail along a mountain stream. Beautiful scenery and an easier hike? I would take that any day!

Had I tried to take the main path, I never would have finished the walk. Following this gentler route, I experienced something totally foreign: A hike I actually enjoyed! I felt so accomplished by the time I reached the church, all thanks to that chance encounter! For the rest of that particular holiday, I managed to go on more treks around the scenic countryside of Georgia.

I have since moved to Georgia and have challenged myself on many other hikes in the Greater Caucasus. If it were not for that first introduction to trekking in Georgia, I do not think I would have had the courage to attempt any other trails. I would have probably been like the many safe tourists who travel the world for hotel pools or shopping streets.

"Adventure" means something different to everyone, but I think there's an adventurous traveller inside all of us. Often it takes one positive experience to prove to yourself what you're really made of. Go out there today and challenge yourself. You will never know what is going to happen unless you step out of your comfort zone!
