We all know that President Halimah Yacob is the current President of Singapore. Many of us, however, are unaware that when she was a child growing up in a struggling household, (16)

President Halimah Yacob was seized with the idea of becoming a lawyer. She wanted to provide the less fortunate access to justice.

Her family, already poor when her father was alive, was plunged into more hardship when he died. She spent much of her childhood helping her mother run a food stall.

"I <u>witnessed</u> how little power and voice those without resources have," Madam Halimah said (18) in an interview in December 2021. It <u>motivated</u> her to study law at the National University of (19)

Singapore, and later to join the National Trades Union Congress as an in-house lawyer. While it may sound impressive, it was not a <u>glamorous</u> job.

In 2001, Madam Halimah joined politics, becoming the first female Malay Member of Parliament since independence and in 2017, she became the first lady President in Singapore.


