Participation in outdoor activities is free.


Entry tickets are required only for the concert venues and museum.



Her gaze dropped to a photograph of me in her hand. She took another glance at me. Leaving the door open, she walked back into the house. I took that as my cue to enter.

The familiarity of the place struck me. I remembered the hint of jasmine in the air. It made me feel at ease, at home. I caught sight of the patchwork quilt that Grandma had painstakingly sewn together for me over months. It was what kept me warm at night during my childhood. Yet a wave of unfamiliarity hit. I looked over at Grandma, still staring blankly at the photograph. I wanted to be a part of Grandma's life once again. I was prepared for battle. I searched for more photographs of our good times together in the hope of jogging her memory. I showed her many videos of us that I had in my mobile phone. I tried all I could.

I knew she would forget even this in a matter of time, for the illness would continue to claim her memories. But no matter what, she would still be my beloved grandma, and I could tell that she wanted to persevere and so would I.

"Bethany, your granddaughter," I responded, accepting her outstretched hand with a smile. Even if Grandma could not remember the good times we shared, I could. Those memories were mine to keep. Perhaps, the battle was not completely lost.
