"Jake, let's get out of here. We can come back another time with a rope or a ladder," pleaded Billy, who would rather be ridiculed in school on Monday.



Jackie Chan was a Hong Kong-born Chinese stuntman, actor and director. His
dangerous acrobatic stunts and engaging physical humour made him an action-film star in
Asia and helped to bring kung fu movies the mainstream of American (51)
cinema.
Chan and his family to Australia when he was six. The following year, his parents sent him back to Hong Kong to a strict boarding school. He studied acrobatics, singing and martial arts. These landed him roles as a child actor and later, as a stuntman. Chan often travelled back and to visit his parents and work in Australia. However, he finally made a (55)
decision to to Hong Kong, a place he called his permanent home. (56) Chan commenced his movie career by appearing in roles in two (57) films which starred Bruce Lee, the rising martial arts superstar back then. Not long after Lee's untimely death, Chan got his big break and started receiving offers to take on major roles in
films, he started writing, directing and starring in his own movies. His own (58) stunts were often extraordinarily dangerous and he nearly died from a fall that fractured his
skull andhis hearing. Chan sustained many injuries as a (59) of doing his own stunt work. In 2016, Chan became the first Chinese (60)
actor to receive an honorary Academy Award recognised his 'distinctive (61) international career'.
Chan had done it the hard way to his dreams and goals to be an (62) International cinematic star. He also founded the Jackie Chan Charitable Organisation in
1998 and is directly involved in providing financial to schools and universities around the world. He is a UNICEF GoodWill Ambassador who has campaigned animal abuse and pollution. He has also assisted with disaster relief
