Reading – Ensure that there is adequate lighting. Hold book 30 cm away from your eyes. Sit upright.



At the computer – ensure that there is adequate lighting. Place screen 50 cm away from your eyes. Take breaks after every 30 minutes of near work.



Get active – Being outdoors creates more opportunities for the eyes to focus on objects in the far distance which relaxes the eye muscles and prevents myopia.



When watching television or playing video games – Limit screen time.
