



History

FoodShare is a non-profit organisation that feeds the needy through its food distribution programme. It was established in February 2010 after Anthony and Ida Bandara read a report in The Citizen Times about bakeries discarding their unsold bread. Roused to action, they then decided to channel surplus food from bakeries to those in need.

FoodShare started with 130 volunteers in 2010. At the end of 2021, our volunteers had multiplied to over 12,000, and together we reached 50,300 beneficiaries across Singapore.



Here's what our Bread Runner of 10 years, Martin Goh, has to say:

Share with us how you have deliberately made giving part of your daily life.

Every Sunday evening, my family and I go on our Bread Run route, where we collect unsold bread and buns at Jia Yi Bakery and deliver them to St. Luke's ElderCare Centre. We also help out at Narayana Social Service on a monthly basis as a family, where we pack food rations together for distribution to the needy.

Perhaps that's why your daughters have this ingrained desire to give. They always have a huge smile on their faces on your Bread Runs!

Yes, they are happy to go on the routes! FoodShare's concept of saving unsold bread that is in perfectly good condition and giving it out to those who need it makes a lot of sense to us.

My elder daughter organises community service activities like food packing and distribution with her own friends as well. She would also save up the money she earned from her own entrepreneurial efforts and buy food for the needy.

Can you share some of your thoughts about contributing to the community?

It's very natural that when you do something good for others, you feel good about it yourself. That itself is a reward. If you have time, give your time. If you have money, share it. If you're blessed with both, do both. The more you give, the more you receive.


