
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

"They fell when I was climbing up. And now I can't get back down! Not without these!" I burst out crying. "Shhh ... " the gardener said. "It's a good thing I used to climb trees and pretend I was riding a horse," she recalled as she quickly scaled the tree. Soon, she reached me, swung one leg over and sat down like she was riding a horse.

She handed over my cracked glasses and I put them on right away. 25 Up close, I could see that her big, dark eyes were actually brown and sparkled prettily when she spoke. She started to descend as quickly as she had climbed up.

"Let's go!" she called out on her way down. "Wait! I don't want to go 30 down," I murmured. "Follow me down quickly - I have to go!" she said, exasperated. I felt bad about wasting her time but I was not ready. I had sought solace from the cherry tree because Doctor Olga had confirmed the day before that my failing eyesight would eventually be completely lost. The sweet smell of cherries comforted me and I could pretend nothing bad would happen when I was hidden up here. To be honest, I 35 had been anticipating the worst for a few years. Still, it hurt to hear my fate. I feared I would not be able to climb the cherry tree anymore.

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When I told her how I felt, she replied, "If there are things you can't do anymore, you must write them into a list. That way, you won't forget anything," she said nonchalantly. It was the first time anyone told me I 40 could do something about my condition. It sounded like a great idea. At least that would be something within my control as compared to waiting for the inevitable and complaining about it. "I made a list too, years ago," she continued. "What was on your list?" I asked.
